Dear friends,

As already announced in the last EURA news letter, I will step down as the president in July 2013. There have been personal reasons for me to take this decision which was not easy for me.

As a result, we have to elect a new president at the next general assembly which will take place in Enschede on the 5th of July 2013, i.e. during the next EURA conference. Up to now there is one candidate – namely Karsten Zimmermann who is professor for European planning cultures at the Technische Universität Dortmund. Some of you will know him from previous EURA events and particularly from the GFORS project in which a number of EURA members were involved.

Looking back to my term in office since September 2010, I think the following achievements can be mentioned.

EURA is now not only a successfully working network of urban scholars from many European countries. EURA is now a legal entity in the form of a registered association, too. This is for example important for signing contracts which was not possible before. In addition, EURA now has the status of a non-profit organisation. This solves the problem of taxation which was an unresolved problem in the past – particularly for the president.

Since 2011 have been offering summer schools for PhD students; since last year we have done this on the basis of a formal agreement in cooperation with the Standing Group on Local Government of the ECPR. However, we have to confess that the interest of PhD students in this summer school is not as high as we hoped for. The executive board will discuss this topic at its next meeting.

We have also made the 'networking activities'

of members more visible than in the past. This is important not only for the outside world but more particularly for other EURA members to become informed about these activities and to join them.

Finally, we revised our website and set up a blog on it to offer a platform for direct communication among our members.

I thank all EURA members who help to accomplish these changes.

EURA CONFERENCE 2013: Cities as Seedbeds of innovation



4-6 July 2013, Enschede, The Netherlands

Innovation is at the heart of the European Union's Europe 2020 strategy.

As part of this strategy the EU wishes to turn the Union into a genuine Innovation Union. The EU's ambition is to develop the Union into a smart, sustainable and inclusive economy. As Peter Hall has demonstrated in his monumental book "Cities in Civilisation", historically cities have been and are always like to remain the seedbeds where major social and economic transformations in our societies are initiated and developed. Oftentimes these transformations are induced by developments in the domains of science and technology. But as Hall has emphasized, although "the force of technological change sets the challenges which society has to face", the impact of technological change is by no means mechanistic. Rather "technology in its headlong march also creates choices and opportunities; and faced with those, urban societies can and must decide for themselves the way they want to go. As so often before, technological progress is paradoxically villain and hero: on the one hand destroying jobs and firms and entire industries and ways of life; on the other, creating vast new economic opportunities and solving intractable problems of urban society. But the way we use it will depend on us" (Hall 1998: 987-988).

Therefore we decided to organise the 2013 EURA Conference around the theme **Cities as Seedbeds for Innovation**.

The 2013 Euroloc / EURA Summer School will be held at De Montfort University, Leicester, England and will be hosted by the Department of Politics and Public Policy and the Department's Local Governance Research Unit (LGRU). It is exciting opportunity for PhD students from all over Europe, researching local government and governance (social sciences, political science, public administration, urban studies, geography), to come together to explore their research with others and to hear from internationally renown academics.

De Montfort University's, Department of Politics and Public Policy's, Local Governance Research Unit has an extensive range of contacts with practitioners and policy-makers. The Summer School will provide an opportunity for participants to meet with key actors in Leicester City Council and Leicestershire County Council. Other opportunities to discuss local government with practitioners and policy-makers will also be available.

The Summer School will therefore offer:

It will be followed by a workshop where participants will present their own research and discuss and explore it with colleagues at the Summer School.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE: The Role of Europe's Industry in the 21st Century

21 November 2013, Zagreb, Croatia

The Institute of Economics, Zagreb, a research institute with a long tradition in economic research in Croatia, is organizing an international conference on **The Role of Europe's Industry in the 21st Century**. The conference intends to bring together experts from academia, international institutions, central banks, government institutions and the private sector to discuss the future of industry in the European Union and South East Europe. The discussion will be initiated by invited speeches and presented conference papers.

Conference Topic

Industry is still the most important element of Europe's economic structures. It accounts for a major part of exports and R&D investments and it creates additional jobs in the services sector as well. However, industry has been severely hit by the recent economic crisis, which has also revealed many of its present weaknesses. Therefore, it is important to explore the present-day performance of Europe's industry, to identify problems affecting industry in both the EU and South East Europe, and to try to propose the most appropriate elements of the future industrial policy.

In such a context, possible topics include (without being restricted to):

- is industry still indispensable for economic growth?
- what have been the main characteristics of industrial enterprises which have performed best during the economic crisis?
- what are the main obstacles to industrial development in the EU and SEE?
- can the industries of the EU and SEE be competitive on the global market and how?
- what kind of infrastructure should be provided by the public sector in order to enhance the development of the competitive industrial sector?

- how to secure knowledge and skills for a new industrial development?
- what industrial policies could be the most efficient in reinforcing industrial growth?
- how to develop the industrial sector in a sustainable way?

More general insights are also welcome, especially those of relevance for the industrial policy in the region.

FINAL CONFERENCE OF EU COST ACTION CIRES: Shrinking cities in Europe

12-13 September 2013, Essen, Germany

The conference ,Cities Regrowing Smaller' is dealing with one of the main challenges of contemporary urban development in many industrialized countries. At the beginning of the 21st century, the shrinking cities phenomenon is widespread in Europe and worldwide. In the affected areas, several causes for population loss can be traced, such as demographic change, outmigration, structural changes in the economy, and suburbanization. These phenomena lead to an urban decline of sometimes severe extent and cause massive problems to the cities. To deal with the results of demographic, economic and physical contraction processes and to plan for the future of considerably smaller but nevertheless livable cities accordingly is one of the most challenging tasks in the near future. The conference thus will bring together experts from different arenas to share their knowledge on the shrinking cities process and to discuss possible approaches to deal with shrinkage. Since both, the extent of shrinkage as well as the local responses, can differ considerably from one city to another, case study reports will provide insights into different cities' management of the situation.

The conference will last for 2 days with several plenary sessions and discussions, organized by the different partners. At the same time, it marks the conclusion of the 4 year EU COST Action 'Cities Regrowing Smaller' (CIRES). The conference will be organized and financed by CIRES with contributions from the OECD Local Economic and Employment Development Program (LEED) and the Bertelsmann Foundation. Location of the conference is the Zeche Zollverein in Essen (Germany), an old coal mine that has undergone a regeneration process and is well known across Germany and Europe as a landmark for structural change in a shrinking environment.

Planning and Place in the City: Mapping Place Identity Marichela Sepe

Routledge, 2013



Under the influence of globalization, the centres of many cities in the industrialised world are losing their place identity, the set of cultural markers that define a city's uniqueness and make it instantly recognisable. A key task for planners and residents, working together, is to

preserve that unique sense of place without making the city a parody of itself. In *Planning and Place in the City*, Marichela Sepe explores the preservation, reconstruction and enhancement of cultural heritage and place identity. She outlines the history of the concept of place- making, and sets out the range of different methods of analysis and assessment that are used to help pin down the nature of place identity. This book also uses the author's own survey-based method called Place-Maker to detect elements that do not feature in traditional mapping and identifies appropriate planning interventions.

Case studies investigate cities in Europe, North America and Asia, which demonstrate how surveys and interviews can be used to draw up an analytical map of place identity. This investigative work is a crucial step in identifying cultural elements which will influence what planning decisions should be taken in the future. The maps aim to establish a dialogue with local residents and support planners and administrators in making sustainable changes. The case studies are amply illustrated with survey data sheets, photos, and coloured maps.

Innovative and broad-based, *Planning and Place in the City* lays out an approach to the identification and preservation of place and cultural heritage suitable for students, academics and professionals alike.

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About the Author

Marichela Sepe is a researcher with the Italian National Research Council in Naples. Since 2003, she has served as a professor, and as a member of the Research Doctorate Committee in Urban Design and Planning at the University of Naples. Sepe is on the Steering Committee of Inu - Instituto Nazionale di Urbanistica (Italian National Institute of Urban Planning), and member of Urban Design Group and EURA (European Urban Research Association).

Network Activities

In this section we publish two calls for the building of research networks on topics of urban research.

Second Tier of Local Government

Survey on the councillors, political leaders/political executive and leading bureaucrats of the second tier of local government in European countries

Partners involved in this networking activity published the above mentioned book on Local Councillors in Europe, edited by Björn Egner, David Sweeting and Pieter-Jan Klok (p. 6). This book is the result of a previous project carried out by this network.

The current project will finish the survey in most countries by the end of July 2013. Some partners will meet at the EURA conference in Enschede, others (less involved in EURA) will meet at the same time at the ECPR Research Session to be held at the University of Essex.

Dubravka Jurlina Alibegovic and Hubert Heinelt submitted an application to the European Science Foundation to fund a conference where results of the surveys will be discussed. This conference will be held in Dubrovnik at the beginning of April 2014.

The group has already a contract with Routledge for a book in which results of the project will be published.

Democratic legitimacy by performance?

This group is working on the questions:

- How far can democratic legitimacy be based on performance of a political system?
- How far can output-legitimacy be replaced by input-legitimacy through participation of those affected by decisions within the respective political system?

The group met in March 2013 in Bensheim (Germany) to discuss draft papers. The papers will be finished during this summer, and final papers (accepted by the reviewers) will appear in *Urban Research and Practice*, No. 3, 2014

Department of Public Administration & The Institute for Innovation and Governance Studies (IGS) University of Twente, Enschede (The Netherlands)

The Department of Public Administration

The department of Public Administration (PA: <u>http://www.utwente.nl/mb/pa/</u>) in Twente was the first PA department in a Dutch university. The current chair of the department is prof. mr. dr. Michiel Heldeweg. PA Twente is committed to contributing to tackling the grand current and future challenges in European public governance. These grand challenges especially include those mentioned in the Europe 2020 agenda: smart growth and innovation, social inclusion, sustainability and economic stability. We aspire to make this contribution by:

- developing and testing bold new ideas about European public governance in the context of our research,
- providing best quality training in systematic thinking for effective and legitimate public governance in educational programmes for our students, and
- engaged scholarship in applying our knowledge in practice-oriented activities (in research, training and consulting) in European public governance.

Research: Institute of Innovation and Governance Studies (IGS)

Tackling the future challenges facing European societies requires smart modes of governance, because traditional systems of governance have failed or give rise to serious doubts regarding their adequacy for solving today's problems. Governance is considered 'smart' when it contributes to effective and legitimate problemsolving under dynamic and highly complex conditions. Our department's research addresses the innovations of governance needed for the development of such smart forms of governance.

The department's staff participates in the Innovation of Governance (IoG) programme of the (IGS: <u>http://www.utwente.nl/igs/</u>), one of the priority research institutes of the University of Twente. The PA department's prof. dr. Kees Aarts is the scientific director of IGS. The department enjoys an excellent research reputation based on its prominent, oftentimes leading role in cutting edge international, comparative research projects and its long standing expertise in quantitative and survey research methods. The aim of the IoG programme is to provide a better understanding of the logic of successful innovations in multi-actor, multilevel systems of public governance. Such an understanding requires a multidisciplinary perspective, combining insights from economics, legal studies, political science and sociology. The IoG research programme focuses on two central questions:

- 1. How do the institutional structure, regulatory systems and decision-making processes affect the innovative capacity of organisations working in the public domain?
- 2. What is the effect of social and technological innovations on the extent to which systems of public governance are able to tackle current and future societal challenges (i.e. meet standards of effectiveness and efficiency) and on these systems' capacity to secure the legitimacy of public governance? And: how can we explain any such effectiveness, efficiency and legitimacy effects?



The programme focuses on multiple levels of governance (local, regional, national and also increasingly on a European and global scale) with special attention for the interaction between multiple public and private actors operating at these different levels of governance. In the context of the University of Twente, research into the interaction between public governance and technological innovations is one of the priority research themes (*high tech and human touch*). The IGS also hosts the Dutch / Flemish Graduate School for Political Science and Public Administration, the Netherlands Institute for Government (NIG: <u>http://www.utwente.nl/nig/</u>), which is accredited by the Dutch Academy of Sciences (KNAW). The department's prof. dr. Bas Denters is currently the scientific director of NIG.

The department is particularly strong in the domain of quantitative and survey research methods (e.g. in the context of the Dutch National Election Study and the European Social Survey).

Education

The department is committed to provide best quality programmes that educate students to take effective and legitimate action in tackling the grand current and future challenges in European public governance. Therefore we train our students in systematic, rigorous and research based thinking and analysis.



The domain of our programme is the study of public governance, i.e. public institutions in interaction with the social environment. The identification and articulation of public problems and the design and management of effective and legitimate policies takes place in a context where (formal) authorities interact with numerous social actors: citizens, interest groups, companies, and civic organizations. Furthermore, in addressing these issues actors have to deal with multiple levels of public governance: local, regional, national, international, global. Finally, given the nature of the public problems we address public governance deals with dynamic issues, within a constantly changing context. In such a vibrant and complex environment the innovative capacity of systems of public governance and the people working in them is of key importance for effectively and efficiently tackling both current and future challenges and the legitimacy of public governance.

Thus, the Twente approach is particularly based on multi-actor and multi-level analysis of dynamic public problems and aims at training students the academic and professional skills needed for the development of innovative solutions that meet both functional (effectiveness, efficiency) and procedural criteria (rule of law, legitimacy, legality, and democracy). As far as the character of our programme is concerned, multidisciplinarity is a core element and the "Twente formula" is fundamental for the new curriculum: the programme provides a solid introduction in researchbased social science - because in our view research skills and methodology are fundamental – and in the core disciplines of Public Administration (public economics and management, legal studies, political science, sociology). The department provides three education programs:
