2015 EURA Conference in Sibiu: Transforming Cities, transformative cities

As the Sibiu Conference approaches, the conference organizers have opened registration and finalized thematic tracks, after reviewing an abundance of proposals. This year's conference <u>Transforming cities, transformative</u> <u>cities</u> is hosted at the Lucian Blaga University of Sibiu in **Sibiu, Romania from September 17**th **to 20**th. Five tracks focusing on *urban transformation*, mobile and special theme workshops, a workshop for young scholars, and keynote lectures by Iwona Sagan (University of Gdańsk, Poland), Enzo Mingione (niversity of Milano-Bicocca, Italy), Gerry Stoker (University of Southampton, UK), Angelika Vetter (University of Stuttgart, Germany) have been finalized for the September program.

EUROLOC/EURA & Cost Summer School

The EUROLOC and EURA Summer School in cooperation with the COST Action (Loc Ref) are organizing a Joint PhD-Training School in September (13-17. 2015), in the island of Spetses in Greece. The four days intensive course, under the overall topic "innovation in local government" is intended to provide training in theories and methods to be applied in the study of local public sector reforms and democracy, especially in comparative perspectives.

Early stage researchers (Phd students and Phds+*years) from different disciplines are encouraged to paticipate. The number of participapants is limited to 24. Participants should submit an abstract that provides a brief outline of their curent work and a short CV by **June 30, 2015**.

EURA Roundtable at the AESOP Annual Congress 2015

EURA representatives Robin Hambleton, Valeria Fedeli, Ivan Tosics, and Karsten Zimmermann, along with Sandro Balducci will be hosting a roundtable discussion on *Creating policy spaces for innovation* on July 13th, 2015 at this year's AESOP Congress. By looking at recent research on civic leadership, planning and urban innovation, this roundtable will attempt to understand how to ensure spaces for dialogue full with creation possibilities. This Roundtable will bring together planning scholars who have studied the creation of policy spaces for innovation in different settings to share ideas and experiences.

The Paris School of Planning (Ecole d'Urbanisme de Paris - EUP)

The Paris School of Planning is stemmed from the merger between the two most important French institutes of urban planning: The Urban Planning Institute of Paris (Institut d'Urbanisme de Paris – IUP) and the French Institute of Urban Planning (Institut Français d'Urbanisme – IFU).

The EUP gathers more than 50 faculty teaching in all major domains of urban planning such as transport and mobility, environment, territorial strategies, social affairs, housing. The faculty is composed of architects, engineers, political scientists, geographers, sociologists, planners, economists and historians.

The first Master program will open in September 2015 with master courses in English and an international program dealing with issues of both the North and South parts of the globe. As a whole the EUP will gather about 500 students from all over the world.

Besides its natural teaching mission, the EUP will be involved in the development of public debate regarding urban and territorial issues and will also be a place of collective expertise and research.

To carry all its missions, the EUP will be strongly supported by its 3 closest research labs (Lab'Urba, LATTS and LVMT) which as a whole group about 300 researchers and doctoral students.

Does having a directly elected mayor make a difference?

A lively debate is underway in European urban studies about the strengths and weaknesses of alternative ways of lifting the quality of urban leadership. Some scholars advocate the introduction of directly elected mayors in cities, believing this model of governance can provide visible, outgoing civic leadership. Others argue that introducing directly elected mayors is a blind alley. They suggest that the directly elected mayor is an outdated 'presidential' model. Focusing on an individual figure flies against the idea of collective approaches to urban leadership and governance, and it is certainly not the model preferred in, for example, Denmark, Sweden and The Netherlands.

A longitudinal study of civic leadership in Bristol, England may be able to throw light on this debate. The Bristol Civic Leadership Project is designed to evaluate whether or not having a directly elected mayor model of governance makes a difference.

In May 2012 the citizens of Bristol decided in a referendum that they wanted to get rid of the long-established committee system of government and introduce a directly elected mayor. In the subsequent election, held in November 2012, citizens elected an Independent Mayor – George Ferguson – to lead the city.

The Bristol Civic Leadership Project has gathered views of how the system operated before the change in November 2012, and is assessing how the new model is working out. The visibility of city leadership has rocketed. In 2012 24% of citizens thought that the city had visible city leadership, whereas in 2014 this figure leapt to 69%.

Visibility is not the 'be all and end all' of civic leadership but it might not be irrelevant. The Bristol Civic Leadership Project might be the first 'before and after' study of the introduction of mayoral governance in a city ever executed. We are carrying out ongoing research on the governance of Bristol and welcome comments.
