On the **16-18 June 2022** the Department of Architecture and Urban Studies, Politecnico di Milano will host the 2022 **Conference** of the European Urban Research Association.

IN THE FRAMEWORK OF THE EXCELLENCE PROJECT, dedicated to exploring Territorial Fragilities, our Department applied for hosting the EURA 2022 conference in order to promote critical reflection on the manifold processes of fragilization, which imposes distress on places and people, particularly in Europe, evidently tightly related to the global transition that the world is experiencing. The event invites scholars to dare challenge mainstream concepts and approaches, promoting transdisciplinary research and contributing to feeding a new policy agenda based on anti-fragility policies.

After two complicated years into the Covid-19 pandemic, the Conference will provide a unique opportunity for this community of scholars to enjoy the pleasure of exchange and critical discussion. They will also encounter an important Italian city, Milan, which represents some of the societal challenges tackled during this exceptional period. An intense program of 11 tracks, with more than 230 papers will be accompanied by mobile workshops, a policy round table, social events and book presentations.

THE DEPARTMENT OF ARCHITECTURE and Urban Studies (DASTU) at Politecnico di Milano, the largest of its kind in Italy, is very glad to welcome the participants to the EURA 2022 Conference in the recently renovated spaces of our Campus and after the forced stop of face-to-face meetings in the past two years.

Our department is a thematic and interdisciplinary research structure. It carries out research, design experimentation and training activities in the field of architectural and urban design, spatial planning and territorial governance, social sciences and urban policies, preservation and intervention on the built and natural heritage, historical and critical interpretation of architecture and the city. We are open to different forms of co-operation with institutional and social actors at the local, national and international levels. We welcome and support visiting scholars and perspective joint research programs.

The specificity and the value of the work conducted by DASTU were recognized by the Italian Mini-

stry of Education, University and Research, by including it in the "Department of Excellence Programme" (2018-2022) for a research project on Fragile Territories, after a national competition. On the other hand, the specific nature of the thematic choice (and by no means predictable) required us to tentatively identify research subjects, fields, and territories, by crossing discipline boundaries, both in analytical and design-oriented terms.

The last big national face-to-face conference we organised, with around 200 participants, took place in February 2020, just one week before our region (Lombardy) started to be known worldwide as one of the worst hit areas by the Covid-19 pandemic. The

The field of investigation is an open one, and pandemic-related issues (as well as those related to climate change and intensifying international armed conflicts) lead us to a condition of radical uncertainty, challenging our forms of rationality. On the other hand, fragility is connected to life (life of people, communities and territories) because fragilities concern processes and dynamics that are not static.

The researchers involved in the past five years in the Territorial Fragilities project have been engaging in the establishment of a general definition of (territorial) fragility that could possibly cover its various shapes and forms. Moreover, they have been exploring different dimension of fragility and a variety of territories around Italy, especially in the most marginal areas of the country, where fragilities are interconnected. The researchers have been engaged in highly interdisciplinary and collaborative research activities, often in deep relation with local actors and institutions, despite the constraint posed by the pandemic situation.

THE TERRITORIAL FRAGILITIES PROJECT

» A TRANSDISCIPLINARY PROJECT STARTED IN ITALY, NOW OPENING TO EUROPE.

WHEN CHOOSING A RESEARCH THEME for the Departments of Excellence Programme 2018-2022, "territorial fragilities" (TF) was deemed a central question for both scientific research and public policy and, more generally, for envisioning a more sustainable and less uneven development of Italy within the international and European framework. The shocking health crisis due to the Covid-19 pandemic has only confirmed the relevance of this issue, with the most fragile territories being most hit by its effects.

We were aware that we were dealing with a highly complex subject and difficult to define, especially in an international context. What is meant by the idea of fragility? How does it differ from the concept of vulnerable or risky?

following months have been challenging for us all: fieldwork activities could not take place, students wishing to learn about cities and territories could not explore them in person, meetings were held just online. Time was running, while space was compressed.

In these pandemic years we have all learned new ways to engage with our research and teaching activities in a situation of deep uncertainty. The pandemic itself challenged the assumptions we had on our disciplines and fed our theoretical reflections, as well as our practice. Nevertheless, we could not wait to come back to in-person activities, and this is what we did as soon as the situation started improving.

Therefore, let me welcome you to Milan and to our campus. We are glad to meet you in person and we are looking forward to exciting discussions, explorations and social events around the city.

The Territorial Fragilities project has invested also in accessible and synthetic forms of communication, such as the TF magazine you have right now in your hands. We are really glad that the second issue of the magazine is completely devoted to the EURA 2022 conference. As you will soon realise, this does not simply include the programme of the conference, but gives space to the different tracks, to their topics, the related mobile workshops, as well as ongoing research projects carried out by the Track chairs in the framework of the TF project or of the DASTU at large.

TERRITORIAL DISPARITIES, MIDDLE INCOME TRAP AND FUTURE SCENARIOS / In Europe, the last 20 years were a period of increasing polarization of social and economic development. Territorial disparities became more acute, on multiple scales: not only more/less developed regions, but also areas in the "middle income trap" and cities/rural areas. Covid and the energy crises can be a game-changer, but uncertainty increased and the design of public policies to reduce old and new fragilities is more difficult than ever. Collective thinking is needed to understand the present and imagine possible, better futures.

A COUNTRY DIVIDED? SPATIAL PATTERNS OF FRAGILITY AND PERIPHERALIZATION IN GERMANY /

Germany has a long history of active regional policy, rooted in the specific power balance between the federal government and the 16 Länder. Creating equal living conditions in all parts of the country is enshrined in the constitution and an important goal of regional policies at both levels. Germany is, despite this constitutional mandate, characterized by quite significant regional disparities - a long-standing socio-economic north-south divide in Western Germany and the even larger economic, demographic and political differences between the "new" Länder of Eastern Germany and the West. However, statistical indicators show that the long stalling process of catching-up of structurally weak regions with the national average has gained momentum in recent years. Despite these encouraging signs, there are clear indications of widespread discontent and dissatisfaction. The very high percentage of votes for right-wing populist parties in recent elections especially in the East have prompted journalists, politicians and scientists to caution against new spatial divisions - some even talk about "left behind regions". In my contribution, I will use the concept of peripheralization to better understand this apparent contradiction between the "perceived" and the "measured" realities in present-day Germany - and highlight developments that will put territorial fragilities back on the agenda: demographic change, ageing of the workforce and international migration.

DISPLACEABILITY: THE NEW FOUNDATION OF URBAN CITIZENSHIP? / The talk develops the concept of 'displaceability' as a central, yet often overlooked, dimension of increasingly fragile urban citizenship, emerging in recent times. While displacement denotes the involuntary removal, displaceability describes a chronic urban condition, characterized by increasingly fragile civil, economic, legal and political rights and capabilities. Using a comparative 'southeastern' perspective, the lecture suggests that displaceability is on the rise, and is increasingly related to deepening social polarization, accelerating digitization and urban policies. Consequently, the analysis observes the emergence of urban 'creeping apartheid' in most contemporary urban regions, where residents are increasingly 'separate and unequal', and a process of 'double polarization' herald further stratification and political tension. Yet, strategies of resistance and alternative planning are also on the rise, seeking to transform the nature of urban rights and powers within a just city, invoking the notion of equal 'metrozenship' as new horizon of urban mobilization. Rebuilding urban democracy and the just city, the lecture suggests, is the main answer to the growing fragility, and the key challenge for urban scholars, planners and activists in the years to come.



TEACHES URBAN PLANNING AND POLITICAL AND LEGAL GEOGRAPHY AND HOLDS THE CHAIR IN URBAN STUDIES AT BEN-GURION UNIVERSITY, ISRAEL, AND IS AN HONORARY PROFESSOR AT UCL DEPARTMENTS OF GEOGRAPHY AND DPU (BARTLETT). HIS RESEARCH FOCUSES ON CRITICAL UNDERSTANDINGS OF SPACE, POWER AND URBAN SOCIETY, WITH PARTICULAR INTEREST IN AN INTERNATIONAL COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS OF ISRAEL/PALESTINE. YIFTACHEL HAS PUBLISHED MORE THAN 150 PAPERS/CHAPTERS AND ELEVEN BOOKS, INCLUDING THE POWER OF PLANNING (KLUWER, 2000), ETHNOCRACY: LAND AND IDENTITY POLITICS IN ISRAEL/PALESTINE (PENN 2006), EMPTIED LANDS: THE LEGAL GEOGRAPHY OF THE BEDOUINS (WITH KEDAR AND AMARA, STANFORD, 2018), LAND/POWER: FROM ETHNOCRACY TO 'CREEPING APARTHEID' (RESLING, 2021). YIFTACHEL IS AN ACTIVIST IN A RANGE OF HUMAN RIGHTS AND SOCIAL JUSTICE ORGANIZATIONS, AND A CO-FOUNDER OF A PALESTINIAN/ISRAELI PEACE MOVEMENT - 'A LAND FOR ALL'.

REFRAMING RESILIENCE FOR MORE JUST, SUSTAINABLE CITIES AND LESS FRAGILE FUTURE / Urban resilience discourse has become increasingly pervasive over the last decade, with numerous studies, policy initiatives, and plans focusing on resilient cities. Drawing on my research into how researchers, practitioners, and the broader public commonly conceptualize and operationalize urban resilience, I argue that resilience needs to be reframed if these efforts are going to support the transformative changes needed to avoid an increasingly fragile future and to foster sustainable and equitable cities.

BROKEN CITIES 2022. FONDAZIONE GIANGIACOMO FELTRINELLI

Broken Cities is a four-day conference, which Fondazione Giangiacomo Feltrinelli promotes in collaboration with DASTU - Politecnico di Milano. The conference, addressing multidisciplinary communities and stakeholders, also offers every day at 6.30 pm public lectures open to the general public. On June the 15th of June the opening public session of the conference will take place at 6.30 pm with a keynote lecture by Nancy Holman, Director of Planning Studies in the Department of Geography and Environment at the London School of Economics and Political Science. The 16th of June is organised in partnership with the European project URBINAT. The programme of 17th of June is in collaboration with Politecnico di Torino and Fondazione Housing Sociale. The third and concluding day - the 18th of June - is based on a partnership with the European Urban Research Association and will host at 7.30 pm a closing lecture by Yascha Mounk, Johns Hopkins University, one of the world's leading experts on the crisis of liberal democracy and the rise of populism.

What is the meaning of cities today? The pandemic has perhaps helped make urban transformations more visible, but difficulties remain in interpreting what is actually happening to cities. Seeing and understanding these changes due to environmental, social and economic phenomena and exploring their impacts on the lives of citizens, is fundamental to thinking of healthy, inclusive and just cities. What will be the future of cities? What are the transformations of urban space, and what are the medium-long term impacts? What is the role of citizens? These are the main issues discussed during the Broken Cities event from an international and multidisciplinary point of view.

EURA 2022 has been organised in collaboration with Fondazione Giangiacomo Feltrinelli and, in close interaction with its four-day event BROKEN CITIES. All EURA participants are invited to join the opening event organised at Fondazione Feltrinelli on the 15th of June at 6.30 pm which will host - among the others - a keynote speech by Nancy Holman, LSE and the final public round table, after the EURA 2022 final keynote session, will be open to all the city.

FROM THE FACTORY CITY TO THE GHOST TOWN. DO CITIES NO LONGER MAKE SENSE?



CONFERENCE DINNER AT MOSSO


The conference dinner will take place in a brand-new restaurant, managed by OLINDA, in the Parco Trotter. Olinda is a collective project born in 1996 to overcome the former Paolo Pini Psychiatric Hospital in Milano. The starting point was to simultaneously reconstruct the biography and identity of people and reconvert closed spaces into open places. Since then, it has become a distinguished urban actor, by favouring and promoting social innovation actions and experimental projects. The restaurant is part of the regeneration project of the Ex Convitto at Parco Trotter. This abandoned building was the guest house of the Parco Trotter school, a highly experimental education project promoted in the XIX century. The park is located in a multi-ethnic neighbourhood and the project, realized with the support of Fondazione Cariplo, includes spaces for catering activities, training, reuse, cultures and social inclusion. The process has come to life and is supported by many energies and local realities, whose intelligences will be fundamental for this space to consistently meet the neighbourhood and the city. The Community Point will be accessible from the summer of 2022 from Via Mosso corner Padua and Park. Olinda will also take care of the catering during the two days of 16th-17th of June.

SPECIAL RECEPTION AT FONDAZIONE RICCARDO CATELLA

A cycle of urban transformations: COIMA, together with Fondazione Riccardo Catella, will host the EURA 2022 participants for a one-hour presentation dedicated to providing an overview of the most relevant projects of urban transformation COIMA has been in charge of in the last 20 years. COIMA is a leading group for the investment, development and management of property assets on behalf of international and Italian institutional investors. Active in the Italian real estate sector since 1974, among its most important projects, the group has developed and still manages the Porta Nuova neighbourhood, one of Milan's largest urban regeneration plans. Fondazione Catella, will host us at Via Gaetano de Castillia, starting at 7 pm. Architects, planners and project managers from COIMA will give us a short overview of some of the most interesting urban transformations COIMA is developing in the city; they will illustrate COIMA's approach to sustainability and liveability issues in the urban transformation project. Fondazione Riccardo Catella will also present the cultural projects it is responsible for in the area. After the presentation, EURA participants are all invited to join a DJ set organised in the Biblioteca degli Alberi, part of a larger cultural programme taking place during the summer period. EURA 2022 conference spaces (in the catering room) will host three main exhibitions:

NEXT GENERATION PODIUM FOR EURODELTA 2.0'S RESULTS

Three panels will illustrate the results of a week-long symposium organised by the DeltaMetropool to bring out fresh perspectives from the young generation and create dialogues between experts in practice and academia. The program is open to the students, young researchers and professionals (0-2 years of experience) working in the field of architecture, design, urban studies, economic geography and spatial planning. The participants worked in teams to develop a 'strategic plan for the region of Eurodelta' by connecting scales of action on three specific thematic narratives: Water Management and Climate Adaptation; Cross-border Mobility and Infrastructure; Smart Specialisation Strategies. The symposium took place online from 2-6 May 2022, and this exhibition will also be presented around the EU.

MATILDE BAFFA UGO RIVOLTA PRIZE FOR SOCIAL HOUSING

The Board of Architects and Planners of Milan presents the results of the eight editions of the European Architecture Award Matilde Baffa Ugo Rivolta, promoted every two years to reward the best European achievements in social housing. A reference point for the debate on social housing at an international level, the Award focuses on the overall quality of the built environment and the sustainability of the architectural project. Social housing projects are residences constructed on the initiative of both public and private operators to tackle the new demand for housing that does not find answers in the free market. ► INCLUSIVE ACCESSIBILITY AGAINST INEQUALITIES AND FOR A TRANSITION TO FAIR URBAN MOBILITY.

AND PROXIMITY

MOBILITY IS AN ESSENTIAL CONDITION to participate in social life since by moving, we can access the places where valued opportunities are available. Providing access to such opportunities may support social inclusion since it increases the possibilities for individuals to realize their projects and personal aspirations. Therefore, reduced accessibility to opportunities, services, and social networks may produce territorial and social fragilization processes that assume different dimensions and characteristics according to socio-spatial conditions.

Nevertheless, the socially justified goal of providing comprehensive accessibility should not always imply more and faster mobility and the use of transport systems.

Granting inclusive accessibility with more local resources and facilities within walking distance, less need for long-distance motorized mobility, and caring for different accessibility needs is emerging in several urban agendas associated with the transition to sustainable and fair urban mobility and supported by the Covid 19 constraints.

The track questions the effectiveness of this emerging model in dealing with different forms of inequalities in the access to essential services and opportunities; in facing different socio-territorial conditions and mobility practices; and finally, in coping with the marginalization of some urban, peri-urban, rural territories that suffer from low accessibility level to the main activities of the economic, political, and social life of a community, up to the configuration of social exclusion. The track aims at

investigating these issues, thanks to case studies and theoretical contributions from the broad field of planning, mobilities studies, geography, and sociology.


Thanks to the different contributions the track will explore: whether theoretical reflections about mobility, accessibility and proximity may help to address policy measures devoted to reducing inequalities in the access to urban opportunities; what are the different factors that contribute to define essential services and opportunities; if ensuring accessibility by proximity is more desirable than increasing accessibility as an unquestionable good and what are the conditions that allow to increase accessibility by proximity in different territorial context (urban areas, peri-urban territories, low density areas); in which way digital devices and technology may support fair, inclusive and sustainable mobilities; what are the strategies that enable upscaling sustainable niche innovations in transport and mobility policy, and what the barriers; and finally if Covid-19 outbreak impacted on the emergence of new needs and mobility practices, and if those practices should they be supported, and managed.

► MOBILE WORKSHOP

PIAZZE APERTE TOUR / The project "Piazze aperte" was launched in 2018 by the Municipality of Milan to experiment with temporary light interventions, turning squares, streets and parking areas mainly used for cars into spaces for people. Through temporary changes in the street use and form in favour of active mobility, the project promotes possible different solutions in the treatment of street spaces, stimulating a reflection on innovative ways to update established regulations and transformation processes of public space. During the mobile workshop, we will visit some "piazze aperte" characterized by different features and aims: a re-purposing parking space via Pacini improves pedestrian accessibility and usability of a sidewalk; piazza Bacone, through a re-marking street and intersection repairs, offers a safe space for children in front of a primary school; piazza Minniti, selected via a participatory public process launched in 2019 and hosting a bi-weekly market (Mercato dell'Isola) was painted by the street artist Camilla Falsini; piazzale Dergano, among the 15 pilot projects promoted in 2018, is one of the square transformed in a permanent pedestrian space. The mobile workshop will give the chance to discuss what changes have driven temporary street experiments in terms of (new) uses and practices. If and which new forms of cooperation/conflict between different stakeholders have been experienced? Which tools have been used, both for activation, conflict management, and monitoring the experiments' effects? If and how norms have been changed following the implementation of experimental interventions? How the approach to space transformation has changed from a design perspective (e.g., materials used, forms of participatory co-design with target users)? And how were those tactical experiments allowed to deal with the spatial limitation imposed by the COVID-19 outbreak?



» NEW FORMS OF STATE INTERVENTION IN A CONTEXT

OF INCREASING UNCERTAINTIES AND POLARIZATION.

AT A TIME OF GREAT UNCERTAINTIES and generalising risks, the State is pushed to refashion its organisation while re-spatialising its action. Natural disasters, climate events, epidemics, economic restructuring imply the State's new ability to confront highly localised crises and put in place reconstruction and recovery plans in specific territories. At the same time, the State is also engaged in designing and implementing transition initiatives - energy and resources projects, industrial innovation initiatives - that also imply exercises in multi-level governance and territorialisation of its ways to plan and implement policies.

Furthermore, these forms of state interventions often address the needs of territories involved in emerging geographies of polarisation, changing entrenched ways in which spatial equalisation projects and policies are framed and implemented.

The track aims at shedding light on these issues by sharing both case studies and theoretical contributions from the broad fields of planning, policy studies, geography and sociology. Hence, contributors will show how state action is being refashioned while addressing specific territorial crises and transition projects. Moreover, they will investigate which state and non-state actors intervene in such situations and what are their rationales. A further concern of the track's contributors will be the multi-level arrangements put in place to promote power-sharing practices among various actors and at a variety of governance levels. The track will also include reflections on the development ideologies driving reconstruction and crisis management strategies. Eventually, the track will promote a discussion of the sources of knowledge legitimating such projects and on different forms of science-policy interfaces set up to respond to crises and transitions.

PANDEMIC URBANISM IN MILAN / The area of CityLife in Milan has become one of the key sites for confronting and managing the pandemic crisis in Milan. The site, a former traditional fairground near the city centre of Milan, was initially developed in the 1920s to host industrial exhibitions. In the 1990s, the fairground expanded on former industrial areas (ex-Alfa-Romeo car manufacturing site called "Portello") near the original site. Starting from 2005, a large part of the fair-related activities was moved to a new fairground just outside the borders of Milan, in the area now known as Rho-Fiera, thus liberating a vast amount of land in the centre of the city. Large parts of these areas were invested by one of the main urban redevelopment projects of the early 2000s, City Life, while a few historical structures and the Portello buildings were turned into the "Fieramilanocity" compound. The CityLife project has been almost completed with the construction of high-rise company towers, upscale residential complexes, new urban malls, and green areas.

During the Covid 19 Pandemic, the area has become the poster-child of both the contradictions of urban restructuring and the city emergency response to the crisis. As skyscrapers were emptied by the rise of remote working, some unused exhibition areas in Fieramilanocity were used for hospitalisation and mass vaccination.

By looking at these two dimensions of the place, the mobile workshop will look at the redevelopment trajectory of the area and at the politics and policies of pandemic reuse of its empty structures.





#05 GOVERNANCE OF TRANSITION

► COMPLEX SOCIO-TECHNICAL CHALLENGES AND AGENCIES

SHAPING SUSTAINABILITY TRANSITION DYNAMICS.

NEW ALLIANCES, approaches, and a constellation of practices are emerging in contexts dense with un-responded societal needs and different in nature and forms of fragility. In their local manifestations, systemic crises (from pandemics to climate change) often reveal deep-seated societal problems, which require a profound shift away from socially and ecologically unsustainable practices. A groundswell of experiments has emerged in recognition of and response to the urgent need for transition. Such attempts may emerge to fill institutional and organisational gaps or to support institutional actors with limited capacity or power to activate transformative dynamics in the face of complex socio-technical challenges. Still, they might question the very way these challenges are defined and addressed, proposing alternative discourses and claiming different modes of action.

Within this perspective, Track 5 aims to reflect on sustainability transition, exploring what are its possible trajectories as observed in empirical and real-world settings.

In particular, the track focuses on agencies shaping or activating transition dynamics and transformative resources at multiple levels.

Also, it discusses the potentials and criticalities of transition governance models and approaches, particularly investigating the role of learning and experimentation. A further reflection revolves around emerging narratives and inspiring stories - from early evidence of transformative tensions to long-term consolidated systemic changes at the urban scale.

The track seeks to unveil under which conditions can fragile territories, cities and neighbourhoods contribute to identifying collective, local, and place-sensitive responses, e.g. related to climate-related and water risks, environmental and sustainability issues, as well as community and social vulnerabilities.



THE TRAGEDY OF LEXICON: WHAT ARE WE REALLY TALKING ABOUT WHEN WE TALK ABOUT SUSTAINABILITY TRANSITIONS?

New alliances, approaches, and a constellation of practices are experimented in contexts dense with un-responded societal needs and different in nature and forms of fragility. Such attempts may emerge to fill institutional and organisational gaps or to support institutional actors with limited capacity or power to activate transformative dynamics in the face of socio-technical challenges effectively. Within this perspective, Track 5 aims to reflect on sustainability transition, exploring what are its possible trajectories as observed in empirical and real-world settings. In particular, the track focuses on agencies shaping or activating transition dynamics and transformative resources at multiple levels. Also, it discusses the potentials and criticalities of transition governance models and approaches, particularly investigating the role of learning and experimentation. A further reflection revolves around emerging narratives and inspiring stories - from early evidence of transformative tensions to long-term consolidated systemic changes at the urban scale. The track seeks to unveil under which conditions can fragile territories, cities and neighbourhoods contribute to identifying collective, local, and place-sensitive responses, e.g. related to climate-related and water risks, environmental and sustainability issues, as well as community and social vulnerabilities.

#09 UNIVERSITY AND PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

► KNOWLEDGE PRODUCTION, EXCHANGE, TEACHING,

AND ACTIONS FOR SOCIETAL AND TERRITORIAL CHANGE.



IN THE FACE OF CURRENT SOCIO-SPATIAL challenges, accentuated by the ongoing pandemic, researchers and HEIs are asked to rethink their public role and exchange with other societal actors. In Europe and worldwide, open science and an "engaged university" model are being experimented with both by individual researchers and several academic bodies, nurturing innovative multi-stakeholders research contexts such as Urban Living Labs. According to such a vision, public engagement (PE) is seen as a structural element, being incorporated into research, knowledge production, knowledge exchange, and teaching and society-oriented actions.

This transition towards inclusiveness opens up promising perspectives of more accessible, usable, and tailored processes of knowledge production for societal and territorial change. Nonetheless, it also meets some obstacles (including cultural ones).


It poses several challenges since it requires the university to overcome its traditional boundaries, invest in new agendas and adapt methods, tools and formats to the competencies and expectations of non-academic stakeholders. This also applies to urban studies, in which PE offers innovative perspectives and insights on different territorial challenges. While the mutual benefit of PE is already appreciated (although often uncertain), further testing, inquiry and consolidation are needed to evaluate impacts on both academic practices and territories.

The track aims to reflect on Public Engagement in urban studies as a tool to improve research on territorial fragility and social inequalities. It will ad-

dress, in particular, some issues, such as the nature of "inclusive research processes" in the field of urban studies and the possible tools to promote co-research and co-design in increasingly complex societies. Moreover, the track will investigate how PE can contribute to renewing how academic knowledge is produced, verified and shared by asking how PE can approaches (e.g. citizen science) contribute to filling the knowledge gap on urban fragility.

The track aims at shedding light on the role of living labs and akin formats in bridging universities and communities and how engaged universities can contribute to balancing socio-spatial inequalities. Therefore, the track will investigate the role played by urban pedagogy in supporting new skills for territorial fragility.

Contributors will reflect on how such a model can improve the social impact and common perception of university at a local/urban level by considering the direct benefits of PE for urban researchers. In other words, they will deal with the question: How can PE actions be fully recognized by the academic community as an added value of (urban) research? Eventually, the track will reveal the kind of adaptations, innovations and investments needed at the institutional level to pursue an engaged university model.

VISIT TO SAN SIRO NEIGHBOURHOOD AND OFF CAMPUS INITIATIVE /

San Siro is one of the largest public housing estates in Milan. It is also one of the most deprived areas of the city, with a very fragile population, precarious conditions of the built environment and public spaces, and a lack of essential services. The mobile workshop consists of a walk through the San Siro neighbourhood and a final round table on the role of university in marginal urban contexts. The walk will be held by members of Mapping San Siro action-research group together with Bocconi University Legal and representatives of the local network "Sansheroes". The participants will know about social and spatial conditions of the neighborhood and visit some spaces for social activities managed by different local organisations. The walk ends at Off Campus San Siro, a place for engaged research and teaching opened in 2013 by Politecnico di Milano, experimenting with innovative and immersive forms of teaching and researching as well as a different role for academic knowledge. Looking at the San Siro neighbourhood as a paradigmatic case from which to reflect on urban inequalities and marginalization processes, Off Campus San Siro actively supports local actors and institutions in designing urban policies and projects more adequate to marginal populations and contexts. Starting from this experience the participants will attend a round table with experts from different countries.

EMERGING GEOGRAPHIES OF WORK, TERRITORIAL

INEQUALITIES AND PLANNING.

BEFORE THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC, European territories and their economies already showed signs of fragility and vulnerability due to several ongoing drivers, from recurrent economic and financial crises to deepening differences and inequalities in access to opportunities. The pandemic aftermath has restructured the relationships between different forms of production and territories, both in the manufacturing and the tertiary sector, in cities and regions across Europe. The connection between the people's location and economic activities is also changing because of the increase in remote working.

This track discusses conceptual frameworks, as well as empirical studies. In particular, it tackles questions regarding the relationships between metropolitan regions and rural areas redesigned after the pandemic.


How are such reconfigurations related to the existing characteristics of different contexts in terms of local economies and societies? What are the roles of job markets, service provision systems, accessibility, and infrastructures?

Several contributions will argue the emerging geographies of work and how they impact the different contexts. The aim is to understand how the long-standing and deepening forms of territorial inequalities at different scales are being challenged, addressed, or exacerbated by the ongoing phenomena; how such new emerging geographies can be interpreted and conceptualised in terms of gender and intersectionality. Moreover, some studies will present how planning schemes, policy tools, and actions may facilitate the revival and renaissance of peripheral, peri-urban, and rural areas.



MOBILE WORKSHOP

VISIT NOLO: A CHANGING NEIGHBOURHOOD / NoLo stands for 'North of Loreto square', located in the Northeast outskirts of Milan. It is an urban district once characterised by working-class and middle-class housing coupled with small manufacturing activities. After the factories' closure, the neighbourhood has significantly transformed towards mild gentrification. NoLo has attracted new urban generations, such as younger cultural and creative workers, as many vacant or underused spaces have been transformed into art galleries, coworking spaces, cafés etc. In the face of such ongoing phenomena, a lively debate about the risks of displacement of weaker populations and homogenisation of the urban functions has started. This visit will show some of the most interesting transformations involving local actors as an opportunity to open up a critical conversation.







DIFFERENT APPROACHES TO RECOVERY AND DE-FRAGILIZATION

GENERATION EU OBSERVATORY

IN EUROPEAN COUNTRIES AND CITIES.



THE TRACK PROPOSES TO COMPARE the ongoing experiences of National Recovery Plans carried out in different countries against the backdrop of the European Union to capture and comment on different approaches to recovery and de-fragilization. The track invites contributions discussing the current experiences in European countries and cities, but also EU policy makers' contributions aiming at setting up a first, experimental observatory. The Track is organised in collaboration with Urban@it - Centro Nazionale di Studi per le Politiche Urbane.

The track articulates the topic of recovery plans, by considering the urban dimension, the relation with COVID-19 and the issue of policy innovation. Therefore, the track invites the contributors to reflect on the attention paid by the recovery plans to cities: are they the backdrop or the focus of the plan? Moreover, the track investigates which (ideas of) cities and territories are considered by the plans and whether new geographies can be inferred. The extent to which recovery plans concern themselves with the transition taking place in cities and territories is under investigation.

Similarly, the track invites reflections on the extent to which recovery plans have taken on board the impetus/acceleration imparted by the pandemic on certain key issues, such as digitisation, employment, health, and ecological transition. More generally, it would be interesting to understand whether recovery plans consider preparedness and territorial fragility awareness at large.

Eventually, the track aims at shedding light on the ways in which National Recovery plans can be considered an important space for policy innovation and whether they can be considered the last opportunity for forward-looking initiatives.


To this extent, the track invites to identify the main keywords included in the National Recovery plans (e.g., capacity building, knowledge forms, integration, innovation, governance).

PROJECTS FOR RECOVERY / The national recovery plan offers cities special fundings to support the post-pandemic recovery. Metropolitan cities, like Milan, have selected priority and areas to focus upon. The mobile workshop will bring participants to explore two of the major interventions, which link together the de-fragilisation of a public neighbourhood and the consolidation from hydraulic risks of the Lambro river (ReLambro project) to create Milan's first metropolitan river park. The workshop will be the occasion to discuss the approach of the city towards the post-pandemic recovery, with the help of policy makers and environmental associations.
